MUSEUM ANNEX HAS TOP PRIORITY

Since 1961 the Ruby Nash home has been a showcase for Ogle County history.

Over the years the house has evolved an "at home" feeling as opposed to the austere atmosphere of a traditional museum.

The Ogle County Historical Society, founded in 1954 by Mrs. Harold Walker (Byron) as a project of the Ogle County Federation of Women's clubs, has been the quiet custodian of the county's history.

Approximately 25 years ago the members built a garage to help house artifacts.

Today the time has come to expand the exhibit space to accommodate the ever increasing donated items.

The addition to the 1878 Nash home would be separate in order not to endanger the existing building's historic status.

The structure will be connected by a walkway, and is planned to be similar in design to the main museum.

The Society has architectural renderings of the proposed addition which will include three rooms for changing exhibits plus an upper floor for much needed storage.

To accomplish this goal the Society is launching its first major fund drive.

The target amount for a complete project is \$65,000 - all hoped to be raised privately.

"We have never accepted state or national funding," said Carol Moore, museum curator, "and we feel that a county as caring as Ogle can take care of its own."

Preserving and protecting our local history is becoming much more difficult in his day of transient families, computers and easily disposable materials. NAMING THE "GAZETTE"

Though the year was only 1851, Oregon boasted a weekly newspaper the "Ogle County Gazette," founded by R. C. Burchell.

After only a few months the name was changed to the "Ogle County Reporter." Burchell continued as publisher until the newspaper was sold in 1853.

Because of its position as the first Oregon newspaper, the Ogle County Historical Society has chosen the "Gazette" as the name of its newsletter.
